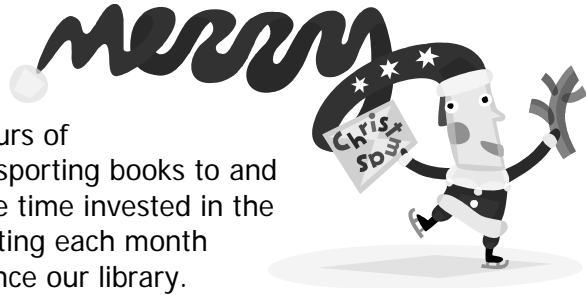
often and check out a good book, magazine, an audio book, DVD or music on CD.

BETTER BOOK SALE 2008: Alternate Date Creates Success

While heavy rain temporarily damped the spirits for the 2008 Better Book Sale scheduled for Chandler Park, plans were quickly in place to cancel and look for an alternate date and place. Thanks to Citizen's National Bank's immediate response, we were able to set up in their empty lot next to 109 E. Jefferson St. and hold the sale September 20, one week later, with perfect weather conditions.

Just under \$3,000 was taken in from brisk sales of better quality paperbacks, hardbound books and media. The location and publicity seemed to attract a constant flow of customers. Plus, over 20 volunteers from the Friends of the Library helped in setting up, selling, and taking down the event. Months of preparation by the regular sorting crew helped in preparing a good sale.

Thanks to all volunteers, people who donated books and media, and supporters of the Friends of the Library this was a big success, especially considering the need to change plans due to weather.

Online Card Catalogs Make for Easy Resource Access

It's 3:00 in the morning, and you can't sleep. You get online to check the book reviews on Amazon.com, and you find a title that really catches your attention. The only problem is, you can't call the library now to see if it's available for loan. What can you do?

You could search the Macomb Public Library catalog online. The following links will help explain how to access materials at the Macomb Library as well the resources of other libraries in the area, around the state or across the nation.

Notes:

- The brochures are PDFs, and they are easier to read if they are printed out. Those who wish to access the links to the catalog brochures will need to have the latest free version of Adobe Acrobat Reader on their computers. All three brochures are also available on the table across from the library's automatic sliding door. (Using Your Library Catalog is the pumpkin brochure, Using Your Online Library Account is the lilac brochure, and Getting the Materials You Want with Holds is in yellow.)

- Those who wish to access their library accounts online will need to use the barcodes off their library cards and their passwords. Those who do not already have a password will need to come to the library in person to set one up. Passwords may be up to 8 characters long, consisting of numbers and/or letters. Those who keep their cards on file at the library will also need to stop by the library to get their barcode numbers.

What if your desired title is not available at Macomb Public Library? If it's not available locally, you could search other sources to see if it's available at other libraries. Titles in our region are the quickest to borrow, but we can also investigate other libraries in Illinois and out-of-state libraries for materials. Please bear in mind that it can take two weeks for borrowed items to arrive at Macomb Public Library, so this option may not be the best for urgent requests.

- Western will not send items to Macomb Public Library, but many items at Malpass Library are available for checkout to those who present photo identification and fill out appropriate paperwork at the Circulation desk.

- Many items at other Western Illinois University university libraries are available to checkout for those who present a faculty ID, student ID, or employee ID.

- Concerned about parking on campus? There are usually more spaces available near the libraries after 5:00 p.m. weekdays and anytime on the weekends.

Notes about I-Share:

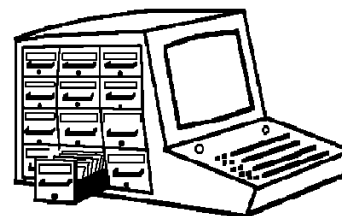
- Requests can be made online by anyone who has a faculty ID, student ID, or employee ID number from Western Illinois University or other CARLI-affiliated schools.

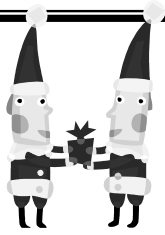
- Macomb Public Library patrons may request materials from I-Share by filling out an Interlibrary Loan Request form at Macomb Public Library.

- Some materials may not be available for loan. Examples of restricted materials may include rare or archive materials, curriculum or K-12 education items, and audiovisual items.
